### More celebration is needed here

If the Tiger Kloof Assembly in 1999, which marked 200 years of Congregationalism in southern Africa, was truly a singing, dancing, cele-strength brating Assembly throughout, the 34th Assembly has been that only in part.

According to some delegates Digest has spoken to, the Sunday afternoon united act of worship.

By contrast, the audience participation at the sports field (pictured above) was poor. Rev Bertram Swartz, Secretary of the Central Region in the SA Synod, felt that this might have been because of the event taking place outside, where sound dispersed and it was easy for attention to wander.

Another delegate pointed out that most of the congregational singing in the worship services was in English and Afrikaans, and that more songs in indigenous African languages could have been used.

That having been said, one older delegate expressed delight that generally, the worship at the Assembly had become more spontaneous and lively than it was a decade or so ago.

#### Listening team reports the good and the bad

On Tuesday afternoon, Rev Martin van Wyk of the Listening Team verbally presented the team's first report on people's experiences and perceptions of the Assembly.

Noting the positives first, he reported that delegates had expressed satisfaction with the accommodation and the high standard and variety of the food that was being served, particularly as it was always ready on time. The Kitchen staff were friendly.

The hosts at the various churches which received delegates at their worship services on Sunday had been welcoming and accommodating. Tours of the areas outside Oudtshoorn and George were especially appreciated.

On the negative side, Assembly members felt that signage in the town to Bridgton School was inadequate, and the reception they received after their long journeys could have been improved.

People expressed the belief that more business could have been done on the first two days, and that workshops should be that, not information sessions.

# Robin Thompson presents his final Treasurer's report

After six years of faithful stewardship of the denomination's financial resources, Rev Robin Thompson presented his final Treasurer's Report to the Assembly on Monday.

He succeeded Mr Ivan brown of the Peninsula Region of South Africa.

Rev Thompson reported two significant changes to the funding of the UCCSA Budget. The first applied to 'designated funds, which, from 2008, will be used more effectively to support the needs of the UCCSA.

The second applies to the allocation of the CWM Self Support Fund for the denomination. Outstanding loans will be called in and the fund used to enable the church to realize the goal of self sustainability.

Before offering for ministry, Robin Thompson qualified as an accountant, and pursued a successful business career.

After completing his training, he was placed in the East Rand group of churches. After completing his internship there, he accepted a call to the Umbilo Church in Durban. After 12



years of service there, he moved to the Berea group of churches, where he has served for almost ten years.

Rev Thompson's skill was recognized by the wider church family when, in 2003, he was elected global Treasurer of the Council for World Mission, where he continues to serve as one of the organizations Officers.

In paying tribute to him, the Chairperson of the Investments Committee, Mr Solwyn Elephant said that the UCCSA owed rev Thompson a great debt of gratitude for the skill with which he had managed the sometimes scarce resources of the denomination when organizations were clamouring for more funding. He always dealt with people with humour and grace.

#### Ecumemical visitor challenges the Assembly

An ecumenical fraternal delegate from the World Council of Churches, Mr Samuel Kabue, (*pictured below*) issued a stirring challenge to the Assembly on Monday afternoon.

Mr Kabue, who is blind, heads the Ecumenical Disability Advocacy Network (EDAN), which is a programme of the WCC, based in Nairobi and hosted by the All Africa Conference of Churches. It was established after the 1999 WCC Assembly in Harare.

Its mission is to encourage the churches and society at large to address the concerns of people with disabilities. Mr Kabue pointed out that historically, people with disabilities have been a disadvantaged community, marginalized in both church and society.

EDAN calls for a change in the mindset of the churches. Disability discourse needed to be introduced into the churches. A paradigm change from charity to empowerment was needed.

Mr Kabue ended by asking what the church was doing to address the issue, and indicating EDAN's willingness to work with the UCCSA>
